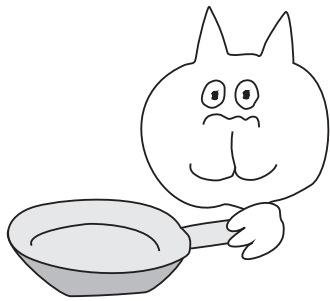

Letters learned in the first series:

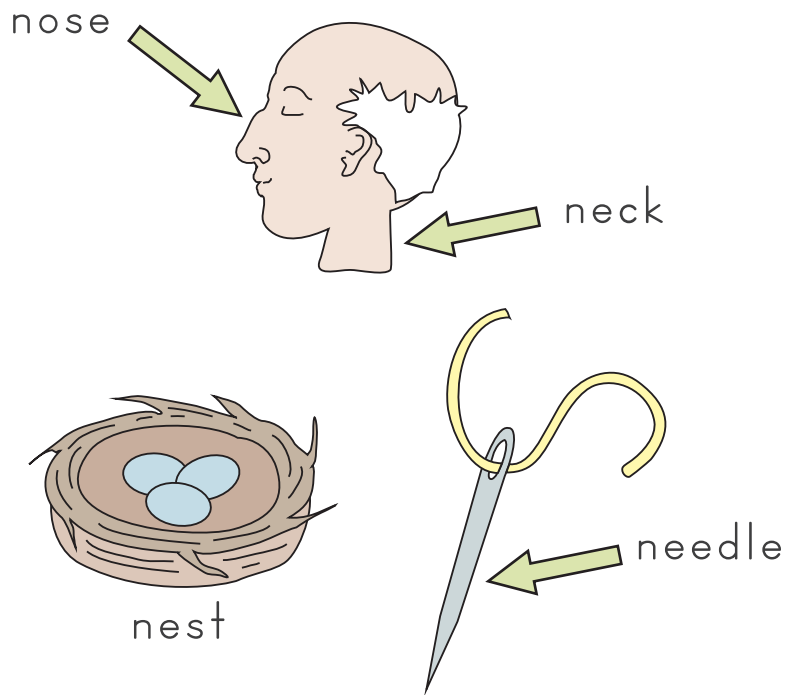
d o g b a i p

Letters to be learned in this series:

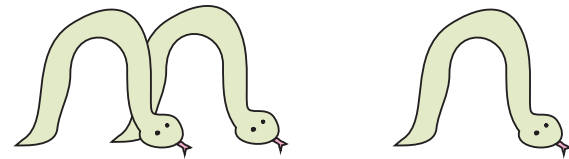
s m (n) e c h u

This is the letter "n." The letter "n" says, "nnnnnn," like in nose, neck nest and needle.

n



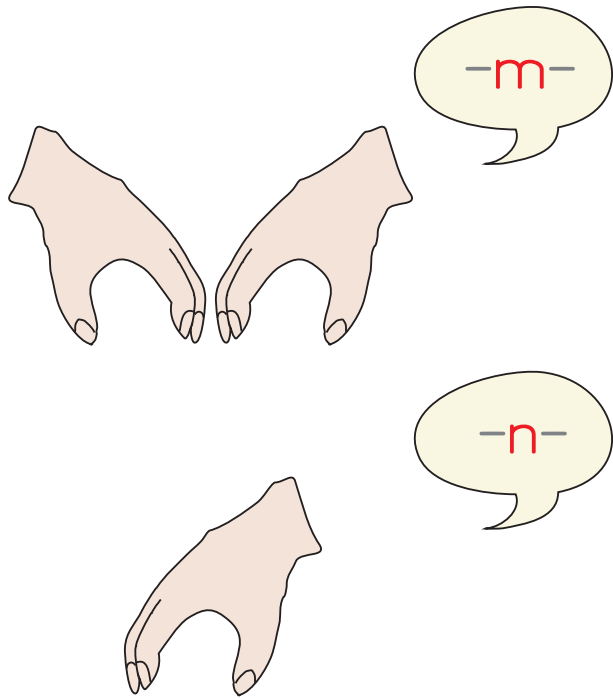
While the letter "m" has two snakes dancing, the letter "n" has only ONE snake dancing.

Let's see who can make the "nnnnn" sound the longest!

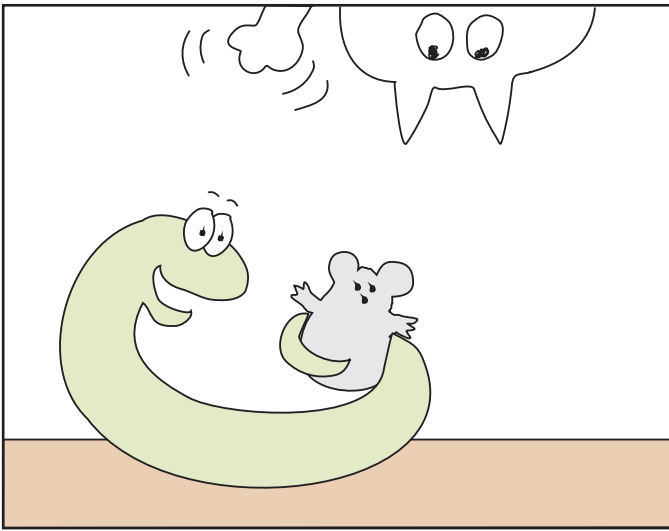
Let's use our hands to make the letters "m" and "n":



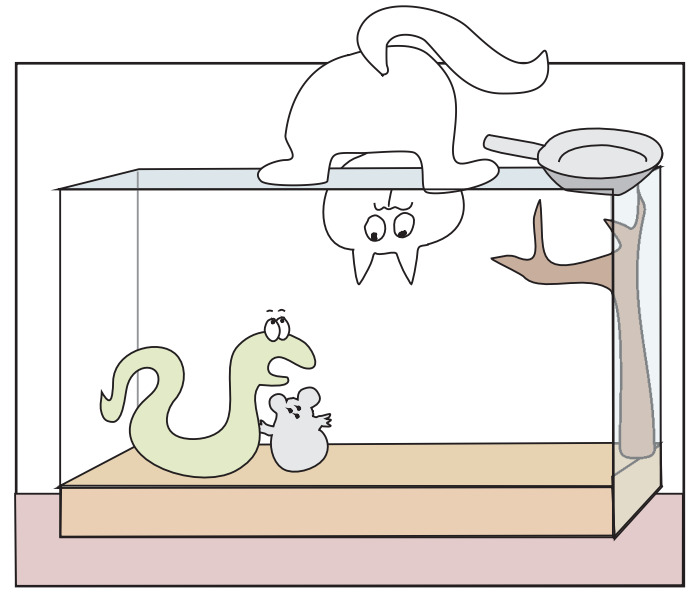
What does the letter "n" say?

Here are two words we can make with the letters "m" and "n" – can you read them?

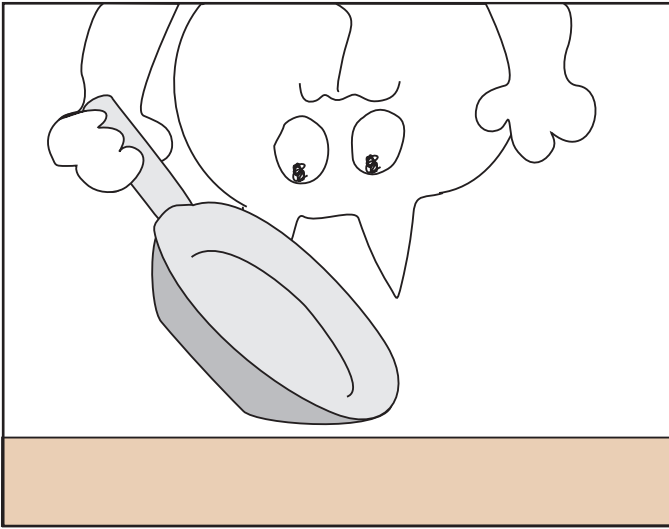
p a m

One day, when **sid** was explaining to **sis** how very, very clever he was, somebody knocks on their glass cage.

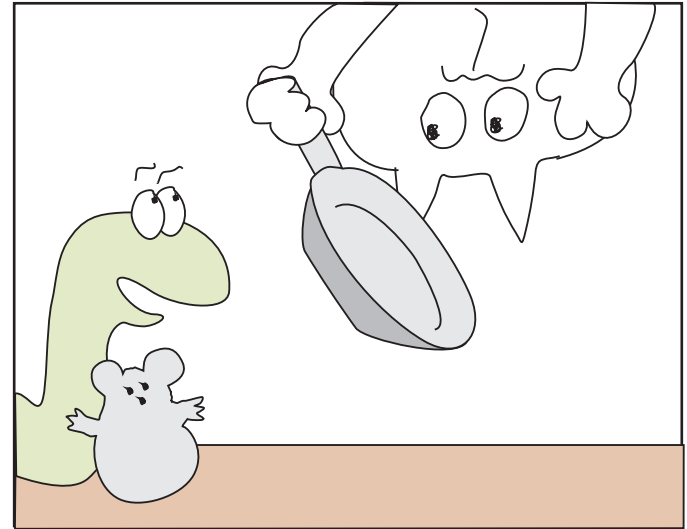


It is a cat. "Uh, hello," says **sid**. "Who are you?"



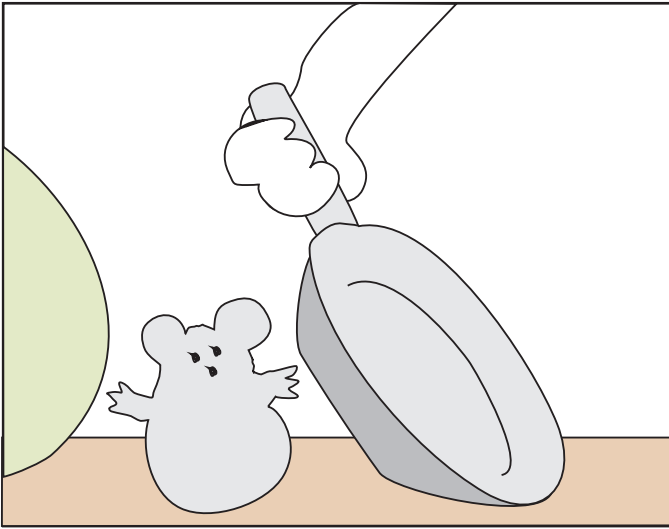
"Allow me to introduce myself," says the cat.

and this is my **pan**."

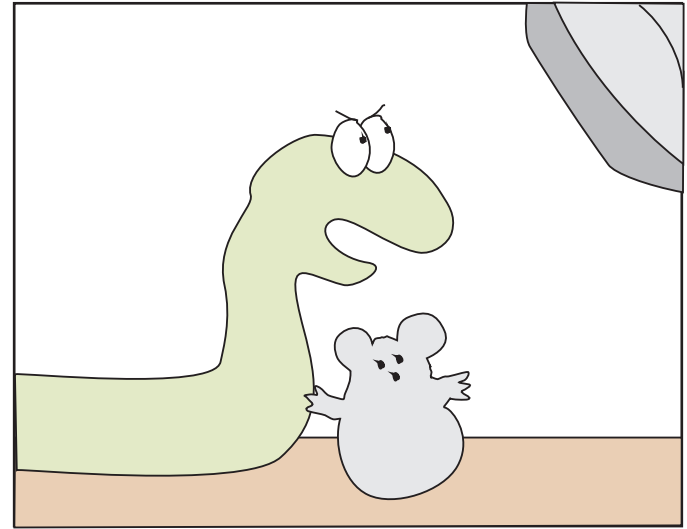


"Hello **pam**," says  
**sid**, secretly wishing

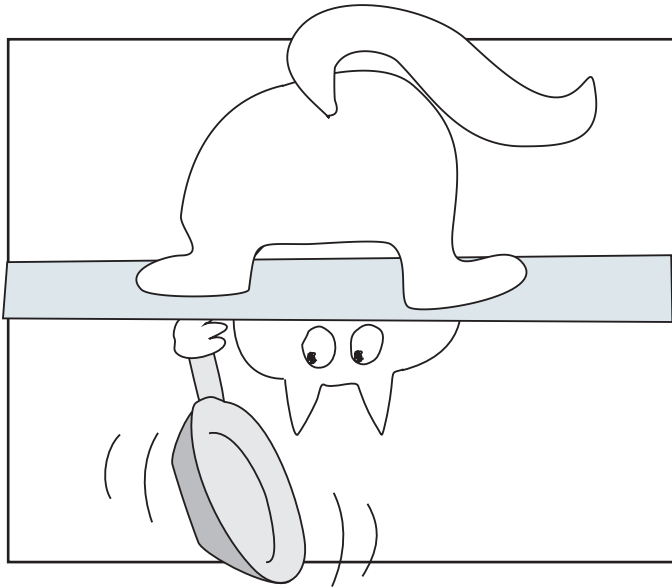
that **pam** would go

nice **pan**."



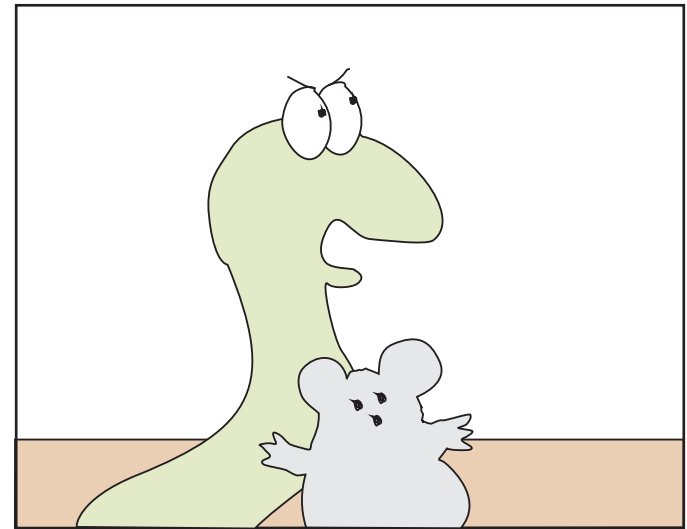
“Yes,” says **pam**, “it is

mouse?”



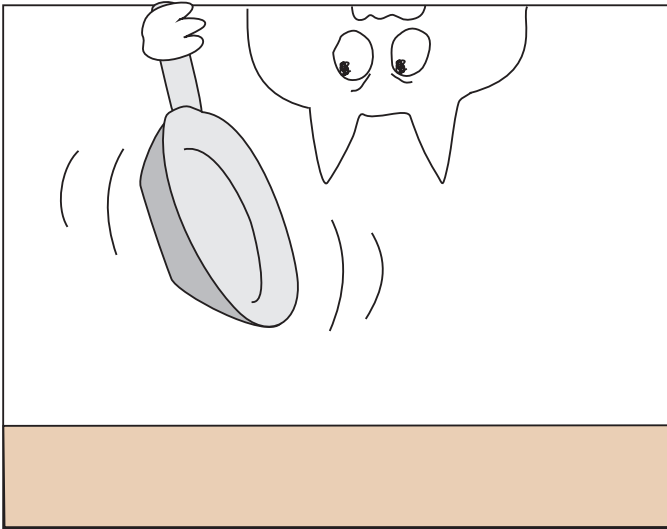
“No,” says **sid**, frowning

"No, no, no," says **pam**.

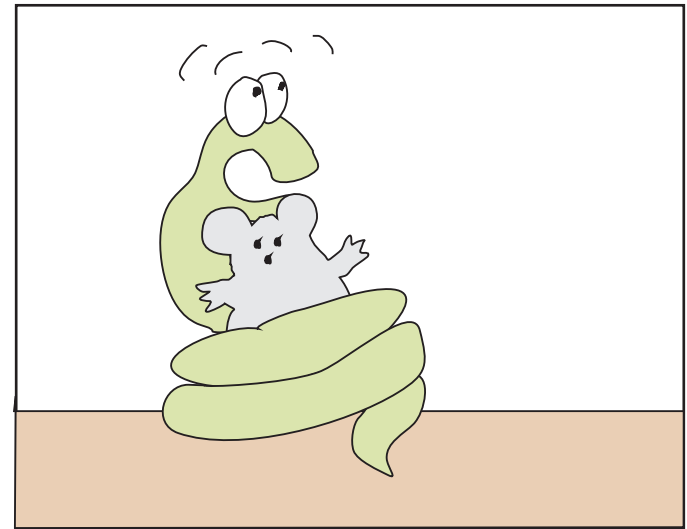
"The **pan** is not for the

tasty little mouse."

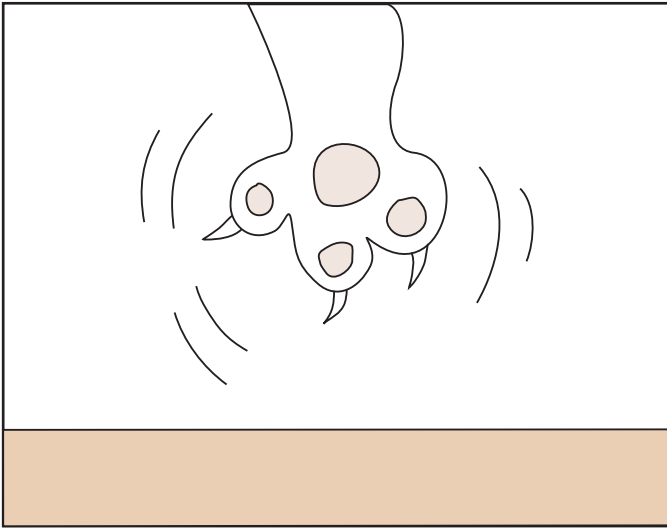

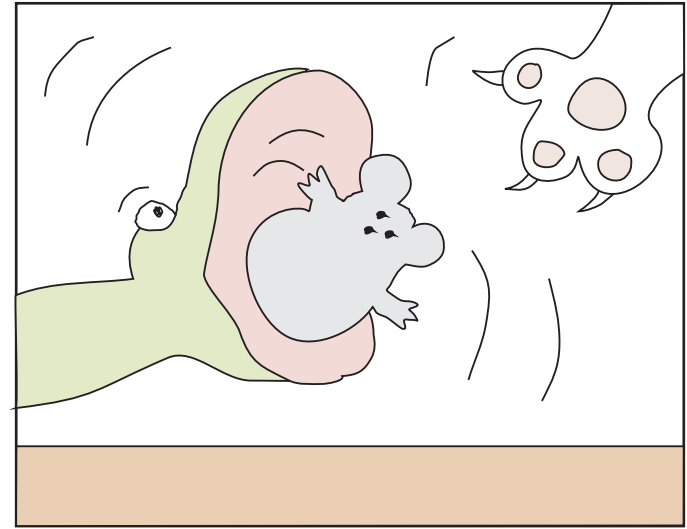
"Horrors!" says **sid**.

"You can't cook **sis**."

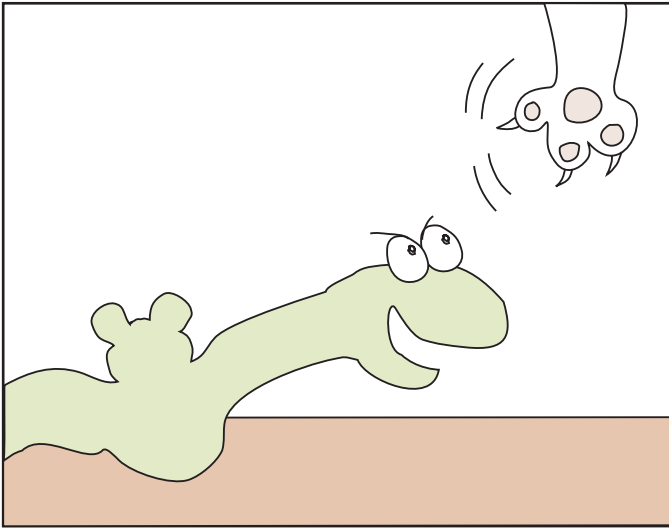




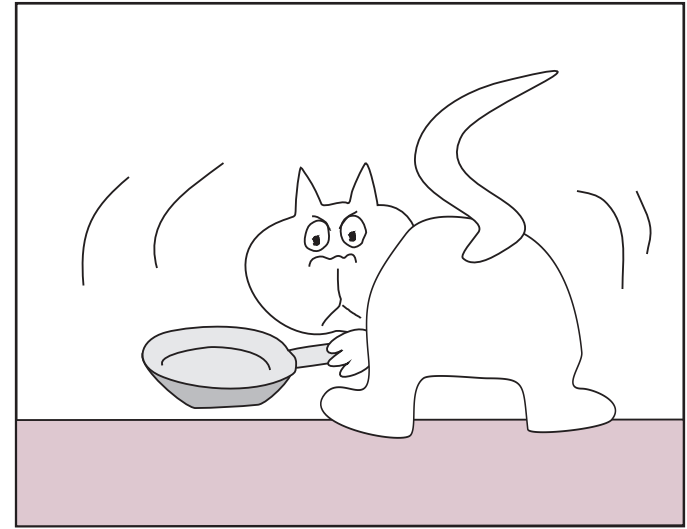
**pam** drops a paw into

share it with you."



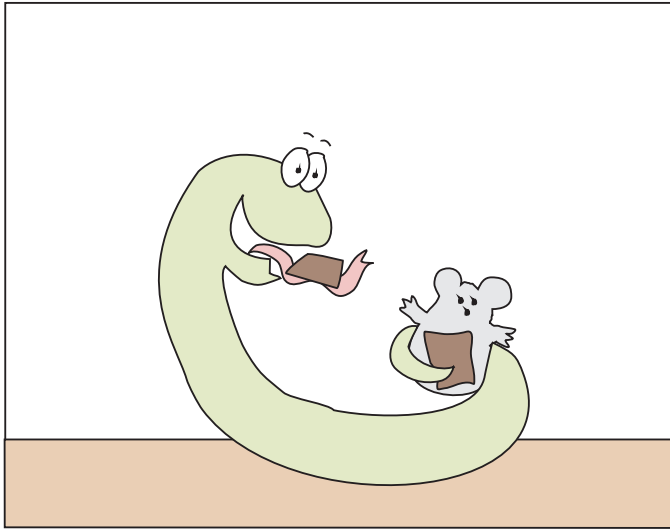
The cat's paw gets closer.

“Ha, ha,” says **sid**. “Too late — I already ate. Now go away, **pam**, you and your **pan**.”

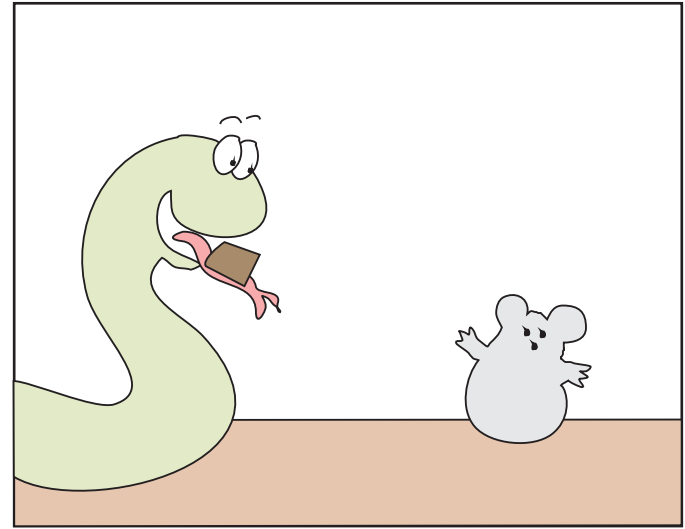


“You horrible little snake,” says **pam**, walking away with her **pan**. “Didn’t your **mom** teach you how to share?”
