Step 2


When doing more than one lesson a day, take a break between the lessons (a snack, a walk, a nap – whatever works). This helps to maximize the mental "processing" of the material.

Lesson 1 (Verbal lesson)


How to write the Capital U.



"Uh" for up, up, cup!

The Capital U looks a lot like the little 'u,' except that it's bigger.

The only real difference is how we write the letters —



With the little 'u,' we draw the "cup" shape, and then (without lifting our pencil) we add a little line at the end.

With the Capital U, we just draw a big cup shape — we don't add a little line at the end.



"Vuh" for vulture:


The Capital V looks exactly like the little 'v' except that it's bigger.

We also write them exactly the same way, except that the Capital V is bigger:






"Wuh" for water:

How to write the Capital X.








"X" for x-ray:

The Capital X also looks like the little 'x' except that it's bigger.

We also write them the same way -



Let's make the letters with our hands and bodies —





































How to write the Capital W.


"Yuh" for yellow, yawn and "Yay!":

The Capital Y and the little 'y' are different –

The little 'v' has some round parts.



The Capital Y only has straight lines.



To help us remember the difference, let's pretend that the little letter 'y' is doing a big yawn — like this... yaaaaaaaaawn!


Let's make the yawn with our hands -



Make the letter 'u' with BOTH your hands.



Then put your right hand on top of your left hand.



Now slide your right hand down to make the letter "vawn."


So, while the LITTLE letter 'y' is a yawn, the Capital Y is a big "Yay!" Let's do that with our bodies -






Stand up and put your arms up and say, "Yay!"

And so we don't mix up the Capital X and the Capital Y, let's practice BOTH those letters. (Do the "jumping Jacks" between the letters X and Y.)



This is how we write the Capital Y -




Draw a little, slanting line, starting at the top of the sky area.


Then draw another slanting line and make it touch the first line.


Then, without lifting your pencil, draw a straight line down to the grass line.










How to write the Capital Z.

(Demonstrate on a blackboard or on a piece of paper.)

"Zzz" for zip:

The Capital Z is easy because it looks exactly the same as the little 'z,' just bigger.

What we do need to remember is that the letters S and Z are different —



The 's' is curvy like a snake.


Also, "sss" is the sound that "sssnakes" make.




The 'z' has straight lines, like a zipper.

Also, "zzzzz" is the sound that zippers make when they zip up.

Let's make the letters S and Z with our hands —



We write the Capital Z like this -


