





Here are some of the words we can make with the letters we know:




One day, big pig brings a bag of balloons to the dog park.



"Watch this," says big pig to dod and bob. big pig


blows up a balloon.

bob wags his tail.




"My turn!" says dod.

dod huffs and puffs


and blows up another

his tail. POP!




"Let's POP lots of balloons," says dod.

of balloons.




bob holds the


balloons with his tail.

They have lots and lots


of balloons to POP.



Uh, oh! bob has too many balloons. bob goes up, up and up.




And because dod and bob are different ends of the same dog, dod also goes up, up and up.




"Quick!" says dod






"Don't worry!" says




Because dod is such a long dog, big pig has to climb up and up and up to reach the balloons.






They all fall down to the ground. Hurray! dod and bob are saved!

and scratches his head.




Did you know," says

big pig, "that you


guys are different ends

dod looks at bob, and bob looks at dod. Could it be?


Could they really be just one dog?
